Lecture: "President John F. Kennedy and the Race to the Moon"

By: Dr. John M. Logsdon, Professor Emeritus at the Space Policy Institute, Elliott School of International Affairs, The George Washington University, WDC

- Why President John F. Kennedy decided that sending Americans to the Moon was in the U.S. national interest.
- How President Kennedy, in spite of many criticisms of Apollo as representing misplaced priorities, supported the effort until his tragic death.
- Why in reality he would have preferred to cooperate with the Soviet Union in space, rather than compete, and how he tried to turn Apollo into a cooperative project.



Dr. John M. Logsdon has for more than four decades been a leading historian of the U.S. space program. He was the founder of the Space Policy Institute at George Washington University and has been over the years widely consulted by the government and media on space policy issues.
